

Bryan previously was employed for twenty five years as a high school English teacher and coach. Kelly, an accountant by trade, and their daughter Kara have been

quickly welcomed by the girls in the Senn Cottage.

"We're absolutely thrilled to have the Conway's, "Vicki Stidham, Southeastern's Director of Residential Services said. "They've already begun to make an immediate impact with our kids. Bryan is teaching a weekly devotional to the girls based upon what fatherhood is supposed to look like. And, Kelly has been busy teaching our girls about how to can jelly and salsa."

"When Raven came home after her baptism, she started acting like a new person. After seeing her, I felt I needed to change, too, in order to become a better person," Kelsey, a 14-year old resident said. "I feel like God is guiding me now. I still make mistakes, but I know my sins are forgiven."

Since their baptisms, Raven and Kelsey have attempted to make some subtle changes to the way they act around others.

"I want to go out and meet new people instead of staying close in the little box I was in," Raven said. "I suddenly want to reach out and tell people that aren't in my close circle of friends about Jesus."

Two of our children, Dee and Billy, were baptized while attending a week of Palmetto Bible Camp.

"I had been thinking about the decision for about a year," Billy said. "During the week of bible camp, I was surrounded by a Christian family. It was just a spiritual place to be. It seemed like the right time to make such a big decision. Now, I don't have the weight of sin on me. And, it seems like I have more people to help me. Mr. Clay and Mrs. Tabitha have been really helpful with everything."


I like the idea of taking something broken and making it new again."
