### SECH transitions to become foster care community

During a recent weekend trip to Asheville, I was reminded of an annual pilgrimage that many in this part of the country make each fall to observe the foliage change in Western North Carolina.

While I have never been one to make a trip for the sole purpose of observing leaves, I was struck during my recent visit by the beauty in the bright and vivid colors of the changes taking place. And, while the volume of cars making the trip doesn't help the traffic challenges that already exist on I-26, I certainly understand the attraction. It is indeed beautiful.

Fall is an exciting time of year football is back, there's a welcome chill in the air, and the leaves are indeed displaying bright colors – and it's a time in which there are changes all around us. At SECH, there is a change in the air as well.

As you are aware, in March of this year, the SECH Board of Directors voted unanimously to transition our agency to become a Foster Care Community: that transition was completed in August.

During that transition, my family and I temporarily moved into one of our on-campus cottages. While this move was made necessary due to a staffing shortage on our campus, it provided my family and me with a unique opportunity to experience what it means to be a foster parent. And we learned so much! We got to

know the girls who lived in the foster home with us as we worshipped on Sunday mornings together, shared meals together,

made a trip to Asheville of our own together, and just enjoyed doing life as a non-traditional family together. It was a great experience, an experience none of us will soon forget.

The girls we lived with during our stay - just like all the children we have served at SECH for the past 55+ years - each have their own unique story. Each story is a challenging one, fraught with trauma and difficult, often nightmarish experiences many of

us cannot even imagine. Many of

them have had almost no stability

during their young lives, moving from placement to placement, from family to family, and from school to school, all the while never knowing how long they will stay where they are or where they will go next.

They crave consistency, they crave permanency; they do not love the instability that has often been the rule in their lives instead of the exception. And that's where all of us at SECH come in.



Many years later his riding companion joined him in church. He wanted to follow Jesus and was baptized.

He began life anew. Illness cut his life short.

### The life-affirming decision to become

I never thought I would become a foster parent. It wasn't something I had ever seriously considered until one day, a teen boy on my caseload completely changed my perspective.

He was just 14 years old and had already experienced more trauma and heartbreak than most people experience in a lifetime. He had been let down by so many adults in his life - his parents, his extended family, and even some of the professionals who were supposed to be helping him.

As his social worker, I felt a deep sense of responsibility to help him. But it wasn't just about doing my job - I genuinely cared about this child and wanted to make a difference in his life.

The more I got to know him, the more I realized that he deserved so much better than what life had handed him so far. He was a bright, curious, and resilient child who had so much potential. But he needed someone to believe in him and support him unconditionally.

After much soulsearching and discussions with my husband. we decided to take the plunge and become his foster parents. It



wasn't an easy decision - we knew that fostering would come with its own set of challenges and uncertainties. But we also knew that we couldn't stand by and watch this child continue to suffer.

Bringing him into our home was both nerve-wracking and exhilarating. We had to adjust to a new routine, learn how to navigate his unique needs and guirks, and deal with the emotional ups and downs that come with fostering a child who has experienced trauma. But we

also experienced moments of joy and pride as we watched him grow and thrive in our care.

Of course, there were moments of doubt and second-quessing. There were times when we wondered if we were doing the right thing or if we were equipped to handle the challenges that came with fostering. It hasn't been easy, but it has been rewarding beyond measure. We've been able to provide a safe, stable, and loving home for a child who deserves nothing but the best. And that, to me, is what fostering is all about - stepping up to be the person that a child needs, even when it's hard.

I have learned so much from my foster son. Most of all, I've learned that sometimes the most important thing we can do is show up for the people who need us. Even when it's hard. Even when it's scary. Even when we don't know what the future holds. Because when we show up, we have the power to make a difference in someone's life. We have the power to help them heal and grow and thrive. And that's what it's all about.
